What is a Community Information Exchange?

A Community Information Exchange (CIE) is an ecosystem comprised of multidisciplinary network partners that use a shared language, a resource database, and an integrated technology platform to deliver enhanced community care planning. Care planning tools enable partners to integrate data from multiple sources and make **bi-directional referrals** to create a shared longitudinal record. By focusing on these core components, a CIE enables communities to shift away from a reactive approach to providing care toward proactive, holistic, personcentered care. Ventura County CIE is hereinafter referred to as VCCIE.

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


BEFORE VCCIE

- Limited access to health and social services
- Siloed system of care
- No centralized data tracking

AFTER VCCIE

- Unified technology
- Agreements to work across sectors
- (nonprofit, healthcare, government)
- Client permission-based information sharing







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Student Behavioral Health Incentive Program (SBHIP)



SBHIP increases the number of TK-12 students receiving preventive and early intervention behavioral health services provided by schools, providers in schools, school affiliated community-based organizations or clinics, county behavioral health departments and school districts, charter schools, and/or county offices of education within the county.



The VCCIE will facilitate this process by providing a system that referrals can be entered, progress tracked, and closed-loop visibility, serving VCOE students and families. Rio and Hueneme School Districts are our initial cohort.


Supporting CBO Participation is Essential!

- Securing active engagement among the participating community-based organizations to send and receive the referrals is essential to the success of the VCCIE.
- The VCCIE represents a modification of current workflows and processes within the system. While the expectation is that it will drive efficiency; like any system change it will initially require more not less work from participating organizations.
- Community Based Organizations are resourced constrained and therefore require additional funding to support modifications of current workflow and services.






How do CBOs Onboard to VCCIE ?
