FOREVER TOUND

Me exist to support the prevention, rescue, and restoration of child trafficting victims.

Our headquarters in Ventura County serves as the primary resource for commercially sexually exploited youth. We also operate a rescue home in India with 90+ children and manage child sponsorship programs for three existing rescue homes in Texas, Thailand, and Ethiopia. Our focus areas are direct services to at-risk youth and community training and education.

Top Goals Related to Human Trafficking:

- 1. Develop infrastructure to accommodate youth referrals and educational demands.
- 2. Enhance communication and education through our website, social media, and online platforms.
- 3. Expand our mentor program beyond Ventura County with Forever Found Chapters.
- 4. Expand holistic therapies, including adding a licensed therapist.

In September 2014, we expanded to address human trafficking locally in Ventura County, California. Forever Found became the first agency in Ventura County to begin a human trafficking program, remaining the only agency specifically dedicated to fighting human trafficking.

The Local Program Department primarily serves youth ages 12-25 and focuses on:

- 1. Trafficking Prevention
- 2. Victim Rescue
- 3. Survivor Restoration
- 4. Training and Awareness
- 5. Community Collaboration

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Intake Needs Assessment

This is a great opportunity for connection and spend time with the youth. Generally, visits last around an hour and they could end sooner, depending on the youth. We want to respect the youth's ability to make choices, therefore allow the youth the ability to determine the visitation length or decline the visitation entirely.

- When is the last time you went to a dentist?
- 3. Do you feel like you have any medical needs that need to be addressed?

Education

- 1. Describe your experience with school up to this point?
- When school is good what makes it good?
- 3. When school is bad what makes it bad?

Getting to Know You

- 1. Describe three things that are really important to you.
- 2. What are two things you are really good at doing?
- 3. What do you like to do?
- 4. What do you want me to know about you?

Goals

- 1. Short goals to reach for this week
- 2. Goal to start working on that can be reached within 2 weeks
- 3. Longer term goals that this process can help start

Case Managers often time provides the youth with a book to read, like, Runaway Girl, and the database is updated with notes and next steps pertaining to: **Education and Information, Safety Plan and Resources, Social and Emotional Support, Health and Wellness, and Faith/Purpose of Life.**

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HOLISTIC THERAPIES

Recognizing the profound impact of trauma on each youth's mental, emotional, and physical well-being, we offer a range of therapeutic services aimed at addressing the unique challenges faced by survivors of trafficking and exploitation.

We recognize that traditional talk therapy may not be sufficient for all individuals. Therefore, we provide access to specialized therapeutic modalities that take place at 'Drop-in' Center Events & Equine Therapy Ranches. These creative and experiential therapies allow the youth to express themselves and process their trauma in non-traditional ways, promoting healing and self-discovery. Holistic Therapies include but are not limited to:

- Equine Therapy
- Art Therapies
- Physical Fitness & Self Defense
- Mindful Movement
- Creative Discussion Groups

Complexities of trauma require alternative therapies as a way for trauma survivors to express their numbed and hidden emotions when they are unable to verbalize them.

We want each youth to feel loved and cared for as part of the journey to recovery, restoration and healing from abuse and trafficking. We desire for them to be a part of a new, healthy community of friends, so they break away from the dysfunctional and damaging relationships that have caused them harm. We see emotional breakthrough and healing for the youth as they gather for special group events and spend purposeful time with their mentors. They feel loved when we can provide food, crafts, and special therapies to help support their new life.

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Holistic Therapies


Art serves as a Teacher - reminding us to practice patience and gentleness with ourselves, to trust the process, to ask for help when "stuck", and that beautiful things can come out of big messes.











"I love equine sessions so much. Learning about each horse's mannerisms and learning about how intuitive they are is so fascinating. Being around them is so exciting, and it brings such a calming effect, taking care of them, brushing them, and petting them. Equine Therapy can be profoundly beneficial for youth who have experienced sexual and emotional, or trafficking.

1. Emotional Healing and Trust Building

Horses are nonjudgmental and sensitive to human emotions, which makes them ideal companions for trauma survivors. Working with horses helps youth:

- Rebuild trust in relationships.
- Feel safe and accepted.
- Develop empathy and emotional awareness.

2. Empowerment and Confidence

Caring for and interacting with a large, powerful animal can be empowering. It helps youth:

- Regain a sense of control.
- Build self-esteem.
- Learn responsibility and leadership.

3. Regulation of Emotions and Behavior

Equine therapy encourages mindfulness and emotional regulation. Youth learn to:

- · Recognize and manage triggers.
- Practice patience and calmness.
- Develop coping strategies in a supportive environment.

4. Physical and Psychological Benefits

The physical activity involved in grooming, riding, and caring for horses can:

- Reduce anxiety and depression.
- Improve motor skills and coordination.
- Provide a healthy outlet for stress and trauma.

5. Therapeutic Relationship and Support

Sessions are often guided by licensed therapists who integrate traditional therapy techniques with horse interaction, creating a holistic healing experience.












FOREVER FOUND Holistic Therapies

FOREVER 3 FOUND CSEC Mentoring | Case Management

Forever Found has reevaluated its performance measures and has thoroughly trained its staff on the Commercial Sexual Exploitation Identification Tool (CSE-IT), provided by the Westcoast Children's Clinic. By utilizing this tool, we aim to reduce vulnerabilities, with markers measured by case managers every six months in the following areas:

- **Housing and Care Giving** | Youth experience housing or caregiving instability for any reason.
- **Physical Health and Appearance** | Youth experience notable changes in health and appearance.
- **Environment and Exposure** | Youth's environment or activities place them at risk of exploitation.
- **Relationships and Personal Belongings** | Youth relationships and belongings are not consistent with their age or circumstances, suggesting possible recruitment by an exploiter.
- **Signs of Current Trauma** | Youth show signs of trauma exposure.
- Coercion | Youth is being controlled or coerced by another person.
- Exploitation | Youth exchanges sex for money or material goods, food, or shelter.



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Mentorship Curriculum

The Becoming Me curriculum is a trauma-informed intervention curriculum designed for youth and young adults impacted by sexual abuse and/or commercial sexual exploitation (CSE). The curriculum supports their healing and helps them establish a strong sense of identity.



Mentorship Curriculum

Key Elements of the "Becoming Me" Curriculum:

- Trauma-informed: Recognizes and addresses the trauma experienced by CSE survivors.
- **Gender-specific:** Tailored to the needs and experiences of youth and young adults who have been commercially sexually exploited.
- Focus on Identity: Helps youth explore and strengthen their sense of self.
- **Empowerment:** Aims to empower youth to take control of their lives and work towards healing and recovery.
- Survivor Voices: Incorporates testimonies from survivor sisters to inspire and empower other youth.
- Various Methods: Utilizes journaling, activities, and discussions to facilitate healing and self-discovery.

Content Covered in the Curriculum:

- **Safety Planning:** Strategies for staying safe and avoiding risky situations.
- Building a Support System: Connecting with resources and creating a strong network of support.
- **Understanding CSEC:** Provides information about commercial sexual exploitation and its impact.
- **Healthy Relationships:** Learning about healthy relationship dynamics and boundaries.
- Re-establishing Relationship with Self: Working on self-esteem, self-compassion, and self-care.
- **Empowerment and Leadership Development:** Fostering a sense of agency and developing leadership skills.
- **Strategies:** For exiting and staying out of the commercial sex industry.
- **Practical Guidance:** Support for navigating the transition out of the commercial sex industry.

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Word on the Street Training

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Purpose

The purpose of this prevention curriculum is to educate, equip, and empower participants, and provide them with tools and opportunities for discussion to prevent them from unknowingly becoming victims of commercial sexual exploitation. There is currently a gap in educating youth on the dangers of commercial sexual exploitation, and without this type of education many youth are becoming victims. Youth who are victims of commercial sexual exploitation commonly experience extreme physical and emotional trauma. Once victimized, it is difficult for youth to escape the exploitive relationship as these children often form trauma bonds with their exploiters, similar to domestic violence victims.

The commercial sexual exploitation of children is an issue plaguing the entire country, disproportionately impacting youth living in poverty, those involved in the child welfare and juvenile justice systems, minorities, and youth who identify as LGBTQ. Many youth in these systems have either experienced sexual exploitation themselves or know other youth in the system who have experienced it. For youth in poor communities across the County of Los Angeles, commercial sexual exploitation has often become a viable option for survival. Many youth are lured into the commercial sex industry in their attempts to survive and then become trapped enduring various forms of abuse. Many youth associated with the system are missing for weeks, months, or even years while they are being trafficked across the city, county, state, and nation through the commercial sex industry. Traffickers target these youth because they are seen as "throw away" kids that parents, caregivers, and agencies have forgotten about or ignored.

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The majority of identified commercially sexually exploited youth have experienced a continuum of sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, and commercial sexual exploitation. The exception is usually with youth who have been victims of *guerrilla pimps*. *Guerrilla pimps* do not develop a pre-exploitative relationship with their victims, instead they kidnap, rape, beat, and exploit youth. Given the fact that many victims of commercial sexual exploitation travel this continuum of abuse, this prevention curriculum will also address sexual abuse and sexual exploitation.
