1. Call to Order		
Chris Modica called the meeting to order at 3:06 p.m.		
2. Announcements

3. Public Comments for Items not on the agenda None heard. None received telephonically or via email.		
4. Presentations from JJCCPA funded programs on the		
efficacy of their program/service.		
Big Brothers Big Sisters Evening Reporting Center (ERC) – Ventura		
and Simi Valley: Danica Selvaggio, CEO, BBSVC, presented an overview of the Big		
Brothers Big Sisters program and how the Evening Reporting		
Centers, also known as Youth rooms, help Case Managers assess		
youth and ensure their basic needs are met before youth are		
matched with a mentor.		
During Fiscal Year 2024-25, an average of 1,200 youth with varying		
levels of system involvement were served.		
The majority of referrals come from Community Partners, School		
Counselors, or Parents/Guardians. An average of 15-25 youth per		
quarter are direct referrals from Probation. Most referrals are for youth ages 11-18, but there has been a rise in		
youth ages 6-10 served at Ventura and Simi Valley due to the High		
School Mentor Program.		
Average attendance for any program hour during the week is 12-18		
youth.		
87% of youth reported having a trusted adult they can turn to and		
know how to contact after completing assigned hours at the ERC.		
85-90% of youth participating in Life Skills programs (avg. 8-10		
participants per session) reported improved confidence in managing		
emotions and social interactions. 87% of youth participating in restorative practices and social		
emotional learning strategies reported improved relationships with		
peers; 80% reported reduced behavioral incidents at school.		
Examples of achievements include:		
 4 out of 5 system involved youth who completed community 		
service hours with the ERC complete an additional goal, such		
as improving grades or learning a new skill.		
15 high school youth signed up to be mentors to elementary		
youth in their communities.		
 7 youth created first resumes and used them to pursue jobs through Mentor Academy. 		
Challenges and solutions for improved service and definitions of		
referrals and retention/engagement for billing purposes were		
discussed.		
Current contract amount - \$391,206/annually.		
Chris Modica expressed concerns about the significant reduction in		
average daily population at the ERCs: only 8/day at Simi Valley,		
14/day at Ventura, 22/day on average for two sites. Working on		
ways to bolster the ADP at Simi Valley.

Interface Restorative Justice:		
Heather Garcia presented an overview of the Restorative Justice		
Conferencing Program - Harm to Healing, serving youth ages 12-17		
and transitional-aged youth ages 18-24. Program is offered in the		
community and at the Juvenile Facilities. Referral criteria is		
determined by the District Attorney's Office in collaboration with		
Probation.		
Up to 60 clients served annually with flexible access to the program.		
Reporting available weekly, quarterly, and annually via Welligent.		
Evidence-based tools used for interactive journaling and motivational		
interviewing. Between 7/2022 through 8/2025:		
147 youth were referred		
54 youth successfully completed the program		
2 in-custody Restorative Justice Circle Keeping groups were		
facilitated.		
 15 youth completed 24 weeks of in-custody Circle Keeping. 		
Current contract amount - \$199,900/annually.		
Chris Modica noted that 62% of referred cases were closed		
unsuccessfully mainly due to difficulties contacting youth and		
families. Currently, there are 18 youth in the program. Looking at		
LIFT expansion and how many of these cases might be appropriate under that program where staff would have direct access to youth on		
school campuses.
